

#### **ANNEXURE I: BEST PRACTICES**

A) A study of Kirnotsav in Mahalaxmi (Ambabai) temple, Kolhapur, Maharashtra, (India).



Kirnotsava is one of the most awaited phenomenon for the citizens of Kolhapur. This play of sunrays is captured twice a year on Januray31, February 1, 2 and November 9,10 and 11. But, due to few obstacles, this festival was not being celebrated properly in recent years. So, the students' team of Department of Physics, Vivekanand College, Kolhapur (Autonomous) under the Guidance of Dr. M. M. Karanjkar came forth to solve the problem

#### **Objectives of the practice:-**

- 1) To make the way of the sunrays obstacle-free.
- 2) To reduce the pollution and increase in amount of mote in air inside the temple as well as along the pathway.
- 3) To control the increasing amount of mahalakshmi devotees as it increases directly the rate of humidity and the temperature in the temple.

Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR): 2017-18

#### The context:-

Keeping above objectives in view, there were many challenges faced by the team while working.

- 1) There were many apartments buildings, shops, Water tanks on the Buildings, Adverting boards. These constructions made it very difficult for the sunrays to enter the temple premises.
- 2) Mahalakshmi temple is the ritual place situated at very centre of Kolhapur city, besides the main and famous market of the city named as *mahadwar* road. *Mahadwar* road is one of the crowded areas of the city, hence there are more than five lakh people, number of vehicles (2-wheeler, 4-wheelers, rickshaws, the buses) running for maximum hours of a day. This doubles the amount of pollution, increasing the mote. This issue requires much more time to be solved.
- 3) Day-by-day there is tremendous increase in the amount of devotees to visit the *mahalakshmi* (*Ambabai*) temple. *Mahalakshmi* (*Ambabai*) temple being a historic place has specifically designed structure which lacks of proper ventilation needed in the present condition. Due to this, the humidity and temperature in *garbha gruha* and *Garbha kuti* increases and leads to increase in amount of water vapors in air. This leads to slight refraction of sunrays which again causes problem for *kirnotsava*.
- 4) The environment i.e. sky should be clear no clouds, dust or smokes.

#### **The Practice:-**

Kirnotsav in *Mahalaxmi* Temple is known as "festival of Sun Rays". It is celebrated at the *Mahalakshmi* temple, Kolhapur in the month of November (9,10 and 11) and in the month of January (31),February (1,2) twice a year during '*Dakshinayan*' and '*Uttarayan*' of Sun. The temple is constructed in such a way that on these days the rays of the sun fall directly on the deity at the time of sunset. The distance travelled by the rays from the *Mahadwar* road to deity is near about 150 meters. At the sun set the rays travel the path: *Mahadawar –Garud Mandup- Ganapati Mandir* back side- *Kasav Chowk- Pitali Umbhartha- Kahjina Chowk - Garbha Gruha-Garbhakutti* and finally on *Mahalaxmi* idol. For this festival, each day nearly 15,000 people gather at the temple.

- \* 31 January & 9 November: Sun rays fall directly on the feet of the deity.
- \* 1 February & 10 November: Sun rays fall directly on the chest of the deity.

\* 2 February & 11 November: Sun rays fall directly on the entire body of the deity.

It is the architect's excellence, which was constructed more than 1000 years ago and can still be observed. Due to obstacles, as mentioned above, in the path for last few years the festival of the Sun rays is not able to occur properly. So, the students from Physics and Astrophysics department of this college under the guidance of Dr. M. M. Karanjkar, HoD Physics and Astrophysics, Vivekanand College, Kolhapur (Auonomous) are working since ten years to overcome this problem and get the remedy on it. The students actually measure the intensity of the sun rays from Mahadawar road to the Garbhacuti through the Lux Meter. It is seen that the intensity of sun rays goes on decreasing and is not up to the expected mark i.e. It requires about 10 to 14 lux to finally reache the *diety*. The middle chamber of *Mahalxmi* temple i.e. *Pitali Umbhartha* to *Garbhagruha* is small in size where the sun rays entere during the kirnotsava phenopmenon, but it is always overcrowded. It has been noted that on an average 1300 people (visitors, devotees, priests) per hour (21.66 people per minute) enter this area for dharshan of idol Mahalaxmi. This number is changed during the different festivals at the temple and is maximum during this festival. The temperature, humidity and air exchange rate in this area should be in proper proportion. At present stage, there is high temperature, humidity, sweating and thermal discomfort and it is closely associated with the number of people, ventilation, and air circulation. All these aspects are crucial to maintain fresh, clean and healthy environment. Presently there is no natural ventilation due to peculiar temple architecture. High amount of moisture, temperature, humidity and carbon dioxide along with various organic substances used in rituals affect the Kirnotsava. The carrying capacity of this area has to be scientifically determined and only optimal number of people should be allowed to enter this place.

Further the height of the apartments buildings, shops, water tanks on the buildings, adverting boards, stray lights, height of the buildings, pollutants in the path of the rays are the main obstacles to be rectified.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

We have now allowed only 25 peoples inside the temple, made the arrangement to screen other people outside the temple, requested the stake holders to remove the water tanks on the buildings and apartments, advertising boards on the shops, some electricity cables on the way, asked to light the street lights after kirnotsava period i.e. after 6.15 pm. It is seen that the sun rays travel in proper way and reach the deity at the proper place and the *kirnotsav* is

complete in the month of January, February and November properly. The required lux level has changed to 4 lux to 12 lux.

The results indicate that if environment is ideal i.e. no clouds, no dust particles, no pollutants in the sky, and only optimal number of people enter the temple during the period of *Kirnotsav* i.e. from 5.15 p.m. to 6.15 p.m., with cooperation from the stakeholders the sunrays festival can succeed.

#### Problems Encountered and resources Required:-

1) This festival is related to the motion of the sun. so during the period of *Kirnotsav*a the sky may not be clear and hence, the intensity of sun rays may not be proper.

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#### B) Stop Water Pollution Campaign at Panchganga River, Kolhapur:







#### The context

Panchganga is the river flowing by the city of Kolhaour. The nearby people throw waste products of religious rituals into the river and water gets polluted. To stop pollution of the Panchganga river, creating awareness among people is an urgent need and it is to be done continuously. Considering this serious issue, the departments of NCC & NSS of the college decided to undertake this activity of creating awareness among the people daily by deputing minimum four students at Panchganga Ghat.

#### **Objective of the Practice:**

- a) To stop water pollution of Panchaganga river.
- b) Two create awareness of clean water among the people.
- c) To prevent local community from throwing materials like Coconuts, Naivadya, flowers used for puja, rice etc into the Panchganga river.

#### **The Practice**

As per the above context the college decided to undertake the responsibility to stop water pollution and create awareness among the people. the departments of NSS & NCC of the college prepared an exhaustive plan of deputing minimum four students every day. Deputed students of NSS & NCC remain present at Panchganga Ghat in morning up to 12 and in afternoon from 4 p.m. onwards to stop people throwing the religious waste like Coconuts, Naivadya, flowers used for puja, rice etc. into Panchganga river. The college students not only stop people from throwing the above material in the river but also create awareness of clean water among the people. During their schedule at Panchganga river, our students also initiated themselves to maintain the cleanliness of the Panchganga river ghat.

#### **Evidence of Success -**

There is a very good response from the people to this campaign of the college. Out students also take photographs of this activity and submit them to the concerned department heads: right from the Commissioner of the Kolhapur, Carporators of the Corporation, local leaders and Hon.Chairman & Secretary of Shri Swami Vivekanand Shikshan Sanstha. The college students have been undertaking this practice since August 2017. Since then, we observe that there is remarkable change in people attitude and we are successful in decreasing the pollution of river in large scale.

#### **Problems encountered and resources – required**

While convincing the people not to throw the waste material of religious offerings (Coconuts, Naivaidya, flowers used for puja, rice etc.) into Panchganga River, some orthodox people do not follow the instructions of our students. However, our students immediately remove / take away the thrown material from the river.

#### Resources required-

During examination period, it is difficult to depute students at the Panchganga Ghat.



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
